We are approaching the end of another school year and the plans for the new school year are already well underway. Enrolment and family numbers are steady. We continue to determine the staffing arrangements for this September. Currently, Mrs. Breimer (6A) is on maternity leave. She and her husband welcomed a son, Logan Hendrik. May God grant them wisdom in raising Logan to His glory. This September, Mrs. Dekker (2B) will also begin maternity leave, the Lord willing, and in November, Mrs. Winkel (5B) will begin her maternity leave, the Lord willing. In addition, Mrs. Hartman has announced that she will conclude her teaching career at the end of June. She has been employed at CCS for over 25 years and we will miss her. We will miss her steady presence, her solid and caring teaching strategies, her "earth days" and Dr. Seuss units.

This past year has seen many exciting events and activities. As I write this piece, we just completed Open House Week, which saw a great turnout for Grandparents/friends Day and for the Sound of Music performances. The work put into the Sound of Music

production by the staff, volunteers and students has been tremendous, and the performances were simply awesome. We have raised the bar for ourselves and this will be difficult to beat. Our students have also been exposed to new initiatives, such as the Computer Coding Club, Rubik's Cube Club, and Knitting Club. The latter included having students present their creations (hats) to McMaster Children's Hospital.

Our senior chamber choir recently participated in a local festival where they earned a gold standard award and an invitation to participate in the national festival in Ottawa. This was very exciting, and of course the choir went to Ottawa where they performed extremely well, earning a silver award!

One very important area that generates a lot of discussion at the BOD level is our building. We are in need of ground space and classroom space. We continue to communicate with the Hungarian church next door about their property, and with the city and the public school board concerning a parcel of the Mountain Secondary School property. Furthermore, we are obtaining information from demographic studies conducted by Harry Meester and receiving input from others - including developers. Our intent is to do our homework as we explore potential options. We welcome your input too. Feel free to contact me.

We congratulate our grade 8 graduates and wish them God's nearness and guidance as they move on to high school and to places beyond.

I convey a big thanks to the staff, the bus drivers, volunteers and committee members for their efforts in making 2015-2016 a wonderful school year. All praise to God.

Close to eighty students tried out, and after much deliberation on the parts of the coaches, the roles were decided. Eventually all eighty students were incorporated into the play in some way. Many others were part of the choirs, sound and light crew, set and props, costumes, hair and makeup, ushering and parking.



Bang, bang...swish, swish...zz zz...testing 1..2..3.. - The set was put together and painted. The props were begged, borrowed and bought. Costumes were bought, sewn and tried on. Sound equipment was rented and set up. Programs were designed and printed.

Louder..., speak clearly..., stand over there..., listen to the music... - Multiple practices for different individuals, scenes, choreography, choirs and finally the whole production were conducted by many different coaches, choir directors and classroom teachers during class time, at every available recess and after school.

Break a leg - Students were often seen and heard encouraging each other, practising lines together, straightening ties and collars, tying each other's shoes, handing out props to the actors going on stage, fixing hair and makeup at the last minute and calming their peers' nerves.

The Hills are Alive... - The first performance begins! Everything moves like clockwork, just the way it was supposed to - well, pretty much.... Crash...ooh, what was that? - The sound of a clock falling from the wall and shattering during the school performance. By the fourth performance all of the bugs were worked out. One afternoon performance was for our school, two evening performances were for the public and the last performance was a matinee for the public and four other schools.

Hurry, you're on next..., where's my hat..., what scene are we on?...shhhh... - Back stage there is a flurry of activity, especially between scenes as actors change their costumes, retouch hair and makeup, and grab props for the next scene. 

I like to play in the sandbox with grandma. *Ethan E.*






