YOU MIGHT NOTICE in this particular edition of the inTouch, there are a number of articles and pictures associated with some of the extra-curricular opportunities students have at CCS, and in particular, some of the sporting activities. I regularly provide tours to prospective families and I am frequently asked about these "enrichment" opportunities. I'm only too happy to share my thoughts on the wide variety of options students can select from. Although some of the extracurricular activities are geared a little more towards our grade 7 and 8 students, we do provide opportunities for participation in choirs, concert band, Battle of the Books, spelling bees, musicals, speech competitions and a wide variety of sports.

With the above in mind, I thought I would share a few thoughts on our sport programs. CCS is pleased to offer a wide range of sporting options for our students, and we have made a concerted effort to allow as many students as possible to have the sporting experience that many of them desire. Students in grades 7 and 8 are asked to list the three sports that they would like to try out for. From there, coaches do their best to ensure that every student gets a chance to be on at least one school team.

As you can see, the school has made a commitment to students to do what it can to provide sport participation. We do add the caveat that a student has to be able to meet minimum requirements for participation, and that usually involves providing the necessary equipment for sport participation, or to be able to play the sport well enough so as to avoid injury. The school hockey team is an example where both of those factors come into play. Students need to have the necessary equipment to play hockey and they have to be a good enough skater for safety reasons. The above approach to sport participation has worked relatively well for us for a number of years.

With this approach, we feel as if we are once again equipping our students to shine, which is directly related to our vision statement: "All God's children are thoroughly equipped for every good work". Students also have a responsibility when it comes to participation. They have to commit to the goals and objectives that we have, and those are mainly related to doing one's best and competing with an attitude of sportsmanship and integrity. CCS has been very competitive in the area of athletics over the years and it is often not difficult to enjoy sporting experiences when things go well. However, it is also fair to wonder what happens when the team struggles to be competitive. What does participation look like then? To give you a bit of an idea of what that looked like this year, I'd like to share my experiences of coaching the CCS hockey team this past year.

CCS has a long history of competitiveness in hockey and we have won numerous tournaments over the years. More recently though, it seems as if far fewer students participate in local hockey leagues, which makes a big difference in some of the players' ability to play the sport. Students who play in competitive or rep leagues usually have a great deal of experience and/or skill. It has not been unusual to have most of the team playing organized hockey of some sort in the past. However, today many students have never played "high level" hockey and the three practices we hold just don't make enough of a difference in skill development for team members. It is in these situations that I receive some of my most memorable moments coaching the CCS hockey team. This past year, many of our hockey players were relatively new to the game, and yet they played against some teams with a great deal of experience. What struck me about the team members was their resilient attitude, their sportsmanship and their positivity. It would have been easy to get frustrated or even upset when things were not going well, but the players did just the opposite. They worked harder than ever and remained positive in the face of adversity and challenge. They encouraged one another to not give up and to continue to try their best. As a coach, I was incredibly proud of how the team responded in the face of those challenges and the sportsmanship team members displayed when faced with tough competition. We may not have won a lot of games, but the players still enjoyed the tournaments and ultimately had fun playing and learning about hockey.

In our world of ultra competitiveness in sport and even in life, it was refreshing to see a bunch of young men and women play for the love of the game and to do their best while playing. It is my hope and prayer that our students will have learned valuable lessons about what matters in sport: to do one's best and to honour God when faced with adversity. I am grateful to this year's hockey team for their amazing sportsmanship and to all the students at CCS who represent our school so well when involved in any extracurricular activity. May we all strive to recognize sport as a gift from God that can be used to honour Him while celebrating the talents that He has bestowed upon us.

Building Unity Project

"HELLO, AND THANK YOU for your inquiry to enroll your child into Calvin Christian School. At this time, we have been blessed with many inquiries and returning families, and currently our class rosters are full. In the meantime, we have placed your name into our growing list of inquiring families, and we will be sure to reach out to you if our situation changes."

This message was in need of being communicated to inquiring families several years ago, but since the start up of the Unity campus, this type of message has not been needed as frequently. However, as time moves forward, these spaces are being filled up. Christian education in the greater Hamilton area is growing!!

Some have been asking how the plans are coming along for this new build. You will recall that there was an approved recommendation for a new facility to be built on the current Unity campus property... and then COVID hit! Where are we now with respect to the timeline? The Unity Management Committee, made up of Board of Directors, Administration, and a few community members, have all been working diligently to move this project forward. What follows is a highlevel overview of the work that has been completed and is ongoing, and the plans for where we are headed.

The Capital Campaign, currently under the direction of Mr. Dan Postma, is moving along. Many in the broad CCS community have received either a visit, a phone call, or some literature expressing our hopes and dreams for the Unity campus and our desire for financial support. This work continues to progress, and we are feeling blessed by a supportive community as we see the fundraising needle move closer to our goal of \$5.5 million. As Mr. Postma continues in this aspect to "Build Unity", we look forward to future stories of joy and support.

The Management Committee was, for a period of time, in a waiting period with the intended goals, but that time has come to an end and progress is being made. Much of the current progress is the behind-the-scenes items. Mr. Dave Rodda, the Project Manager, has been in contact with several agencies that will address the required work before the shovel can hit the ground; these agencies include archeology, Ontario Hydro and traffic studies. The Management Committee continues with ongoing discussions about how to best navigate the different steps we need to take. We shared detailed information to "Build Unity" at the May membership meeting.

Administration is also hard at work, overseeing the daily operation of the two campuses as well as speaking into the above mentioned actions, including some of the architectural designs for the new Unity classrooms and the overall layout of the proposed building. One of the upcoming decisions that the Administration will undertake is how best to fill the classroom with furniture and other necessary resources, as we continue to "Build Unity" so students can fill the rooms and hallways.

And finally, the Board of Directors have also been involved, in varying degrees, with each of the above mentioned aspects to "Build Unity", by ensuring stewardship with our finances and diligence in our policies, promoting the hopes and goals to the broader community, and being supportive in time and prayer.

In closing, I give thanks to God and to each individual who has been working over the past few years to see this plan come together. We seek your continued and faithful support to "Build Unity" through prayer, finances, time, listening ears, and engaging conversations as we work together to broaden the reach of Christian education in the greater Hamilton and Caledonia area.

IN KINDERGARTEN

THIS YEAR, THE KINDERGARTEN CLASSES at Calvin Christian School have been exploring the question, 'How can we use colour and creativity to create beauty and glorify God?' Creating beauty offers praise to God. He has given us this world to enjoy, to play in, to explore. We see God as THE artist! We want to use our natural creative desires and abilities to bring joy to our communities. Albert Einstein once said, "Creativity is intelligence having fun!"

Every month, our Kindergarten classes explored a different artist. We learned a little about the artist's life, their artistic journey, and their style. Often we read children's books that featured that artist. We then got busy being creative, making our own masterpieces in the style of the featured artist. During this time, we explored how to use colour to create a happy, calm, excited, or reflective mood. The students learned how to use different kinds of paint, pastels, fabric, markers, and 'found' items in their creations.

In **September**, we learned about the colourful world of Jackson Pollock and made splatter paintings. Vases of sunflowers inspired by Vincent Van Gogh were our focus in **October**. In **November**, we learned about Georgia O'Keefe as we painted giant poppies. We learned about pointillism and Georges Seurat as we made Christmas trees in **December**. Ted Harrison and his arctic landscapes were our inspiration for **January**. We had fun making snowmen in the style of Pablo Picasso in **February**. In **March**, we used bright colours to make Kandinsky style paintings. **April** introduced us to the art of Paul Klee as we used oil pastels to make cats. In **May** and **June** we learned about the fun and colourful art of Romero Britto and the distinctive style of Piet Mondrian. The children and teachers have also been blessed to have local artist Betty Brouwer come to the



West 5th campus and teach us how to create story art with materials and stones. It was delightful to hear the 'story' behind each little artist's creation.

To conclude our year of art, we celebrated our inquiry with a trip to the Children's Art Factory in Guelph.The children also loved highlighting their beautiful art in our art gallery during Grandparents Day and Open House this past May.

We hope that you will be inspired to seek and create beauty in this world. Dust off your paint brushes and pastels and see what happens!

Relaunch of West 5th Library

After a few months of quiet in the library this fall, we've been so thankful to be able to relaunch the CCS library at West 5th! It's been so fun to welcome the students back to our ocean-themed library space and provide lots of opportunities to share books once again. We spent the month of January reading books such as *I Love Sharks Too* by Leanne Shirtliffe, *Barracuda* by Sigmund Brouwer and *Fish in a Tree* by Lynda Mullaly Hunt.

As each class enters the library, we sing our own library song to help us get quickly settled on colourful pillows and feel ready for our library lesson. The students listen to a picture book or a chapter from a novel. They hear a short lesson on practical library skills like book care or the characteristics of a genre, before scattering around the library to search for books. After the students have checked out their books, they head to the centres of the day, which may include art, creative writing, fine motor activities or reading/listening. These centres are wonderful ways for students to engage with reading creatively, using all of our different talents.





Reading aloud is an important part of fostering a love for books by introducing students to a wide variety of authors, series and genres. Read-alouds engage students' curiosity and expose them to books they may not choose on their own. Our goal is for every student to see themselves as a reader, regardless of whether they read picture books, levelled readers, graphic novels, chapter books or information books. In order to ensure that students all leave the library with a book in their hands, we continue to do our best to make books accessible by providing fresh graphic novels, new middle grade titles and contemporary levelled readers, as well as growing the library collection to complement the size of the student population.

Some of this wonderful work is possible through funds raised in the annual Scholastic book fair, with the assistance of an amazing group of library volunteers, and with the cheerful diligence of a co-op student Maryn Voortman from Hamilton District Christian High School.

A Visit to Alexander Graham Bell's Homestead by Mrs. K. Van Houten

In the winter, the grade 3/4 class at Unity campus studied magnetism as part of their "God Speaks Through Magnetism" unit. Near the conclusion of this unit, the class visited Alexander Graham Bell's Homestead in Brantford.

Magnets played an important role in the invention of the telephone and, as a result, the Homestead offers a "Wonders of Magnets" program for students.

The field trip was divided into two parts. We began the day with a variety of experiments with magnets. The students sorted magnetic and non-magnetic objects, and investigated why some items were not magnetic, even if they were made of metal. Next, students measured the strength of several different types of magnets. One of the tests involved putting a magnet between the pages of a book to see how many pages it would take before the magnet would no longer attract another magnet (it's a lot of pages!). The students also worked with iron filings and finished with an experiment to see if magnets would work when they are immersed in water.

After a snack break, the students were then given a tour of Alexander Graham Bell's house. They were able to see how people lived in the mid 1800's. Near the end of the tour, the guide explained how and where the telephone was invented and the role of magnets in this world-changing invention.

One of the highlights for the students was testing out a hearing tube that would have been used by someone with hearing loss. Mr. Bell's mother and wife both had hearing loss, which was an important reason for many of Mr. Bell's experiments, including the telephone. The students also enjoyed seeing and trying out some toys that children may have played with in the 1800's.

Fearfully and Wonderfully Made

This winter, grade 5 worked their way through our science unit entitled "Fearfully and Wonderfully Made" and reflected on Psalm 139:13-14. Through discussions, videos, hands-on activities, experiments and worksheets, students spent time learning about their respiratory, circulatory and digestive systems, in order to answer the driving question: "How do our bodies and body systems show that we are fearfully and wonderfully made by God?"

One exciting learning activity was inviting Mr. Jason Taekema into class, along with a fetal pig and pig heart specimens. Students were given an authentic hands-on learning experience to be able to see and touch the parts of the different systems they had been learning about. Focusing specifically on the respiratory and circulatory systems, students were able to touch the heart, feel the diaphragm, stick their finger through the aorta and much more. We thank Mr. Taekema for this wonderful learning experience for students. When asked what they learned through seeing and touching the specimens, as well as their thoughts on this experience, students had a variety of responses:



I thought when Mr. Taekema cut open the pig it was gross, but after the shock it was cool. I learned that the diaphragm is a really strong muscle.

Something I thought that was cool was the pig's heart. I also thought the pig's intestine was interesting. When we saw a pig's organ system, I was grossed out at first, but then I found it cool! I learned that the heart is a little hard but mostly squishy, that the lungs have a slimy gooish thing on them to keep them from heating up, and I saw how big the aorta is!

> It was an amazing experience and I really enjoyed it!

When Mr. Taekema came in with a dead pig, I learned that when you feel like you have butterflies in your stomach, it's actually your small intestines moving up and down.

Throughout this unit of study, students were asked to reflect on how what they had learned showed that we are fearfully and wonderfully made by God. Students were able to provide many reflections, including:

God made my epiglottis smart enough to know when and how to open and close so I can talk, breathe, eat and drink without choking or getting food or water where it shouldn't be. God made it so my body systems all work together perfectly without me having to tell them to.

God gave me mucus in my stomach so that my stomach acid does not eat away at my stomach.

God put my ribcage in the perfect place to protect my lungs.
